Reply:

My 10 ELLs are all part of one ESL Google Classroom, though they are in different grades. I create assignments and then assign them to one or more particular students. When I need to set up a Google Meet for my 2nd graders, for example, I'll create the meeting, choose which students should participate, and then post it. Those students are the only ones who see that particular post/assignment.

I've also chosen to be a part of their General Ed teacher's Google Classrooms so that I have an idea of what is happening during the rest of each student's classes. I don't look at all the postings, but I've been able to answer questions for students and parents when they don't understand an assignment.

## Reply:

I did both of these things. I had Google classes for students from 4th to 8th grade by building and I was in the classroom with the mainstream teachers. I did assignments and grading for my classes in "my classroom" but found out about mainstream assignments my students' were responsible for from the mainstream teachers' classrooms. You can modify individually for each student or groups of students with Google classroom. I found it helped me organize my instruction better.

Yes, you can. When you assign work for that student, you pick what students to assign it to- you can do all students or multiple or one.

#### Reply:

I did both of these things. I had my ESL google classrooms already set up like my schedule was in school and I have mixed proficiency levels in my classes so they were mixed. When we went remote in March, I added myself to their homeroom teachers classrooms (mostly as a way to catch my students attention and communicate with them because they weren't checking all their teachers google classrooms at first for assignments).

Side note: It gets annoying checking multiple places and you have to remember to turn off notifications, otherwise you get a lot of notifications from the other students in the homeroom class that aren't yours. Eventually, I got my kids attention and in a routine that I stopped posting to them in the homeroom google classroom and we just used my ESL google classrooms.

I would post ALL assignments with visuals, modeling, examples, videos, sentence starters/frames, word boxes... that way the language supports were there to help ALL proficiency levels. However, if we start out virtual again, I might put my 0 English or level 1's in a separate google classroom with separate assignments more suited for their language needs.

Hello, your scenario sounds similar to mine. I have one ESL Google Classroom for all of my students. Google Classroom allows you to choose who sees assigned work OR you can put your students into groups (that's what I did) right in your Google Classroom. I also was added as a co-teacher to their gen ed teachers Google Classrooms so I can "push in" to help them with their gen ed assignments, etc.

#### Reply:

You can individualize lessons and views you select who sees what as individual assignments and in the stream.

Try to play with it first. I used one class for 3 grade levels and individualizations were easy.

# Reply:

As a middle school and high school teacher, I have 1 class set up for MS and 1 for HS. You can easily differentiate assignments for students since there is a drop-down menu on the right side to check/uncheck which students will receive which assignment. I also ask content-area teachers to add me to their classes as a co-teacher so I can look at assignments and due dates. While we were on remote

learning, I was able to help students during their content-area class time with assignments also, through Google Meet/Google Docs or Google Slides. I was also able to modify and assign assignments for the content-area classes on the content-area Google classroom. Content-area teachers were happy that I could do this. Sometimes though, I would not see the assignment until that morning which made making modifications a bit stressful.
